Kim Addonizio is the author of four poetry collections including *Tell Me*, A National Book Award Finalist. Her fifth collection, *Lucifer at the Starlite*, will be published by W.W. Norton in October 2009. The scenes depicted in this series evoke both the physical hardship of country living, and the peace and simplicity that often draw people to it.
